In only four seasons as the Ichabods' head coach, Washburn head coach Craig Schurig has led the Washburn football program to a new level after building on a 2004 Mineral Water Bowl Championship. The Ichabods posted their first NCAA Playoff appearance as well as Washburn earning their first MIAA Championship in 2005. Schurig earned the MIAA's Coach of the Year for his efforts leading the Ichabods last season. The conference championship was the first by the Ichabods since the 1983 season. He was also named the AFCA's Region 3 Coach of the Year.

Washburn finished the 2005 season with a school-record nine wins and a 7-1 mark in conference play.

The 2004 season saw the Ichabods record their first winning season since 1999 and their first postseason win since 1986 with a

36-33 win over Northern State in the Mineral Water Bowl.

In his four seasons at Washburn, the Ichabods have had three All-American selections, two MIAA Freshman of the Year and 41 players receive all-MIAA honors. He has been equally on task with players in the classroom with 54 Ichabods named to the MIAA Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll, including two Academic All-Americans.

While under Schurig, the Ichabod football program has also seen sweeping changes in facilities with the improvements to Yager Stadium including a new artificial turf and

While on the Pittsburg State coaching staff, Schurig was a part of an NCAA national finalist squad in 1995, four MIAA Championship teams and eight NCAA Division II Playoff teams. He helped guide one of the top defenses in Division II, including the top-ranked defensive squad in 1999.

Prior to working with the defensive backs, he worked three seasons with the Gorillas' tight ends.

Before arriving at Pittsburg State, Schurig spent the 1992 season as a volunteer assistant coach at his alma mater, Colorado School of Mines joining the Gorillas in 1993.

Schurig, a Willingboro, N.J., native, was a four-year letterman as a defensive back at Colorado Mines and was selected team captain as a senior. He earned secondteam all-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference honors as a senior. He graduated in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in petroleum engineering.

Schurig earned a master's degree in physical education at Pittsburg State in 1996. Craig and his wife, Louisa, have a daughter, Samantha, and two sons, Mitchell and Michael.

Brian Miller Offensive Coordinator

Brian Miller begins his fifth season as the Ichabods' offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

In four seasons at the helm of the Ichabod offense, the squads have recorded four of the top nine passing seasons in school history and four of the top seven total offensive years in Washburn history. Three of the top five rushing seasons have been behind under Miller's offensive linemen and three 1,000 yard rushers.

Miller has coached one second team All-American offensive lineman,

> one first team all-region selection and four all-MIAA picks. In 2005, the Ichabods

set new school offensive records for most passing yards, total offense, passing touchdowns, first downs and points in a season while recording three-straight 1,000 yard running backs.

Minnesota-Crookston from 1997 to 2001.

Prior to coaching at UMC, Miller coached for the Northern State Wolves, where he was special teams coordinator, and coached defensive line and running backs, each for a season.

Chris Brown Defensive Coordinator


Chris Brown is in his fifth season as the Ichabods' defensive coordinator and defensive secondary coach.

While at Washburn, Brown has coached one All-American in Fletcher Terrell, two all-region picks and two all-MIAA selections.

In four seasons as the Ichabods defensive coordinator, Washburn's defense has improved each season. This past season, the Ichabods forced a MIAA-leading 30 turnovers and allowed 3.7 yards per carry. In 2005, the Ichabods also recorded 29 sacks, which were the most since the 2000 season and the combined total of the previous three seasons.

Brown came Washburn after spending three seasons as the secondary coach at Liberal High School where the Redskins compiled a 37-5 record from 1998-2001. Brown, a native of Liberal, Kan., is a

1996 graduate of Pittsburg State University where he recorded 470 tackles in 43 starts in his career at free safety. He is one of

only three Gorillas to earn All-American honors three times. He was an unanimous first team All-American selection his senior season and was named the CNN Division II National Player of the Year in 1995. In the championship game as a freshman he recorded a record 21 tackles against Jacksonville State. He was also named to the NCAA Quarter Century Team from all players from 1975 to 1999 at free safety. Brown will be inducted into the Pittsburg State Athletic Hall of Fame this fall.

He and his wife, Daphne, live in Topeka with their boys, Hunter and Hayden.

Rob Robinson **Wide Receivers / Recruiting** Coordinator




While at Washburn, Robinson has coached three of the top seven receivers in school history as well as two all-MIAA selections and an all-region receiver.

Cooper HarrisLinebackers/Special Teams Coordinator

Cooper Harris is in his fifth season with the Ichabods after spending one season as graduate assistant for the 2001 NCAA Division II Champion North Dakota Fighting Sioux.

He coaches the Ichabod linebacking corps and is also the Ichabod special teams coordinator. At Washburn he has coached four of the top 10 tacklers in Ichabod history as well as one All-American linebacker in Grant Gould, four all-region picks and four all-MIAA first or second team picks.

In 2000, Harris served as defensive coordinator at William Aberhart High School in Calgary, Alberta. He helped coach the team to a city championship.

Harris played in the Canadian Football League from 1995-2000 for Toronto and Hamilton. He was a linebacker, special teams captain and special teams MVP in 1998 for Hamilton and was a member of two Grey Cup champion teams in Hamilton and Toronto.

A native of Calgary, Alberta, Harris graduated from Pittsburg




Recruiting in-state priority No. 1 for the Ichabod coaching staff
