✓ **THE GAME:** The Lady Blues host Missouri-Rolla 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon, looking to improve on their 12-0 overall and 3-0 MIAA record after beating Southwest Baptist 89-68 Wednesday.

Against Southwest Baptist, Washburn scored 51 points in the first half, which were the most points by a Lady Blue squad in a half since Feb. 13, 1999 at Missouri-Rolla. At Rolla that night, the Lady Blues scored 59 in the first half to cruise to a 90-52 win.

The Lady Blues are off to their best start since 1992-93, and are tied for first in the MIAA with Emporia State. The Lady Hornets are 9-2 and also 3-0 after winning 65-57 at Missouri Western Wednesday night.

The Lady Miners enter the game with an 3-7 overall and 1-2 MIAA record after beating Pittsburg State 55-52 in Rolla, Mo. Wednesday night to snap a 30-game MIAA losing streak.

Washburn is also looking to extend its 17-game home court winning streak at Lee Arena, dating back to its second MIAA home game of the 2001-02 season. The streak is the sixth longest current home court winning streak in Division II women's basketball.

✓ THE COACHES: Ron McHenry is in his third season on the bench for the Lady Blues, posting a 48-21 (.696) career record since being named the head coach on May 8, 2000.

He became only the fifth coach in the history of the women's basketball program at Washburn and the first new head coach since Dick joined the Lady Blues as the head coach in the 1977-78 season.

In only his second season as a head coach, McHenry engineered one of the best turn-arounds in NCAA Division II, guiding Washburn to a regional berth and a 23-7 record. McHenry guided the Lady Blues to his first 20-win season last year after posting a 13-14 mark in his first season as Lady Blues head coach.

Prior to his appointment, McHenry spent the previous 11 seasons as a member of the men's basketball coaching staff under current coach Bob Chipman. While on the Washburn bench, he was a part of 243 wins. In addition to his basketball duties, McHenry was the men's golf coach for eight seasons.

McHenry has had a diverse coaching career. He began his career as a graduate

assistant to Chipman during the 1984-85 season. He then went on to Perry High School in 1986 where he served as assistant boys coach.

McHenry quickly moved up the coaching ranks in 1988 when he assumed an assistant's position with the Topeka Sizzlers of the Continental Basketball Association. McHenry eventually became the Sizzlers' interim head coach before joining the Washburn staff for the 1989-90 campaign. During his first year on the Washburn staff, McHenry was the department's academic advisor.

McHenry played for Washburn after stints at Coffeyville Community College and the University of Kansas. He started for the Ichabods during the 1983-84 season.

He graduated from Washburn with a bachelor's degree in communications and went on to earn a master's degree in sports administration from Wichita State University in 1987.

McHenry and his wife, Mischa, have three children, Danielle, Samantha and Ronnie. Danielle played one season of volleyball for the University of Kansas and transferred this season to Washburn and was named to the All-MIAA first team as a Lady Blue and is also on the Lady Blue basketball squad.

Alan Eads, who served as an assistant coach at Southeast Missouri State University for the past eight seasons, was named June 17 as the new head coach of the Lady Miner program.

Eads has guided the Lady Miners to a 3-7 record in his first season at Missouri-Rolla.

Eads helped lead Southeast to a 16-12 overall record and 8-8 mark in the Ohio Valley Conference during the 2001-02 season, as the Otahkians finished fifth in the OVC standings.

Southeast finished fourth in the OVC the previous year and won 19 games overall as recently as the 1998-99 season.

While at Southeast, Eads served as the team's chief recruiter and worked primarily

with the post players and the team defense – a unit which was ranked third in the OVC this season after being the top defensive squad in the conference in the three previous years. Eads believes that defense is where the Lady Miners can build their foundation for future success.

Eads has also built an impressive resume as a head coach, leading Moberly Area Community College to a record of 199-37 over a span of eight years from 1986-94. He took the Lady Greyhounds to the NJCAA national tournament on five occasions, including a third place finish in 1986-87 and fifth place showings in 1987-88 and 1993-94.

Moberly had two 30-win seasons under Eads and also had seasons with 29, 28 and 26 wins during his tenure.

He was named as the Region XVI "Coach of the Year" on five occasions and also led the Lady Greyhounds to five region titles, all of which eventually led to berths in the national tournament. Moberly was the region runner-up on three other occasions and won the regular season title in all eight seasons Eads spent there.

During that time Eads coached eight players who earned All-America honors, including four that were named to the first team. He was also chosen after the 1990-91 season to serve as an assistant coach for the South team in the United States Olympic Festival in Los Angeles, Calif.; that team went on to win the gold medal during the 1991 festival.

Eads also served as the head coach at Moberly High School from 1979-83, where he led his teams to two district titles and two trips to the Missouri state tournament.

Eads is originally from Trenton, Mo., and earned his bachelor's degree in education in 1973 from the University of Missouri-Columbia; he also received a master's degree in education from there in 1982.

Blues used a dominating performance in the first half to beat Southwest Baptist 89-68 in Lee Arena Wednesday night.

The Lady Blues opened up with a 22-4 lead that extended to 35-9 with 6:22 left in the opening half when Ineke Ingram made a layup. Alison Garrett's 3-pointer with 35 second left gave Washburn its 51-20 halftime edge. Washburn's 51 points was the most in a half since Feb. 13, 1999, when WU scored 59 in the first half to win at Missouri-Rolla 90-52.

Southwest Baptist tried to respond, but couldn't pull within 18, as Carissa Goeglein finished with a team-high 21 points and eight rebounds to lead Washburn.

Crystal Walker added 17 points and 12 rebounds to post her 12th career double-double, while Garrett had a career-high 14 points and Ingram added 11 points. Washburn owned a commanding 47-30 rebounding edge

With the win Washburn moved to 12-0 and 3-0 in the MIAA. The Lady Blues are tied for first in the MIAA with Emporia State, which won 63-55 at Missouri Western Wednesday.

✓ LADY BLUES LAST TIME VS. MISSOURI-ROLLA FEB. 9, 2002:

TOPEKA - The Washburn Lady Blues won a fourth-straight MIAA contest with a 63-50 victory over Missouri-Rolla.

The Lady Blues opened quickly, taking a 12-4 lead early on Crystal Walker's layup just four minutes into the game. Washburn continued its first half dominance with a 9-0 run to take a 26-9 lead, before taking a 34-17 lead at the half.

The Lady Blues had another run by scoring 11 straight to make it 51-25 with 11:09 left on Jovanae St. Cyr's break layup. The Lady Miners rallied but couldn't get within single digits the rest of the game to lose their 17th straight game.

Carissa Goeglein led the way with 14 points, while Walker and St. Cyr added 13 and 12 points respectively for the Lady Blues. The victory was Washburn's fifth straight in Lee Arena.

✓ **ABOUT THE LADY MINERS:** The Lady Miners snapped their 30-game MIAA losing skid with a 55-52 win over Missouri-Rolla Wednesday night.

Rebekah Judy hit 9 of 12 shots from the field and finished with 18 points and nine rebounds. Latisha Poulard scored 14 points and Birute Paulauskaite added 11 points.

Leah Kessenich leads UMR with 13.2 ppg and 9.8 rpg, while Judy is averaging 7.7 ppg and 5.0 rpg. Junior guard Tiffany Rhodes is out for the season after suffering injuries in an automobile accident on Dec. 8. Rhodes averaged 12.2 points in

six games earlier this season before the accident.

LADY BLUES IN LEE ARENA: In their 18th season in Lee Arena, the Lady Blues are 221-51 (.813) overall at home. The longest winning streak was 44 games from Dec. 1, 1990 to March 20, 1993.

The Lady Blues were 15-1 in Lee Arena last season, outscoring opponents by an average of 75.6 to 59.9 (1209-959 points). Washburn's current home court winning streak is the longest since March 13, 1993, when Washburn won its 44th straight home game after capturing the South Central Regional Title 75-62 over Missouri Southern.

Washburn has won **17 straight games** in Lee Arena after falling 69-67 to No. 5 Missouri Western on Jan. 2, 2002 in the MIAA opener last season. The streak is the sixth longest in NCAA Division II Women's Basketball.

✓ LATEST WBCA POLL (JAN. 8):

The Washburn Lady Blues moved up nine spots to No. 7 in the WBCA National Poll after entering the top 25 for the first time since 1997-98 earlier this season.

The team received its first national ranking in the WBCA Division II Women's National Poll since the 1997-98 season, when it entered the poll in a tie for No. 24 in Dec. 11, 2002 poll released by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

The ranking was Washburn's first since Dec. 27, 1997, when the squad opened the season with a 6-0 record to obtain a No. 19 national ranking. The Lady Blues lost five straight games after the 6-0 start in 1997-98 and had not been in the WBCA National Poll until this season.

✓ TURNING UP THE D:

As of statistics on Jan 5, 2003, Washburn led the MIAA and was 13th in the nation by holding opponents to 54.1 points a game.

✓ WASHBURN TIP-INS:

- The Lady Blues have opened MIAA play with a 3-0 record for the first time since the 1994-95 season and are looking to improve to 4-0 in conference play for the first time since the 1993-94 season when the squad opened MIAA play with a 9-0 mark.
- Crystal Walker is now 16th on the all-time scoring list with 966 career points. She is also 14th on the all-time rebounding list with 493 career boards. Walker, the reigning MIAA MVP, is tied for fifth in the league in scoring at 15.2 ppg.
- Carissa Goeglein is leading Washburn and is third in the MIAA with a 52.5 percent clip from the field. She is also tied for fifth with Walker in the MIAA with in scoring (15.2 ppg).
- Kristy Chapman is 22nd in career scoring with 821 points and has 92 career 3-pointers. She is just 19 3-pointers away from breaking Brenda Shaffer-Dahl's career record of 110.
- Kristy Chapman is also 12 of 22 from 3-point range in her last five games, including 4 of 5 against Truman State Saturday. She opened the season by missing her first six 3-pointers in the first two games and has hit 23 of 48 (47.9 percent) since.
- Bethany McGraw has dished out 17 assists with only two turnover in seven home games this season. She also has made 6 of 10 3-pointers and is 12-for-12 at the foul line in Lee Arena this season.

Reserve guards Alison Garrett and April Roadhouse have similar assist-to-turnover marks in Lee Arena. Garrett has 10 assists with one turnover and Roadhouse has 11 assists with two turnovers at home this season.

- Washburn has outscored opponents 71.9 to 56.1 this season and has outrebounded opponents 38.8 to 31.6.
- Washburn has opened the season with a 12-0 record for the first time since 1992-93, when it opened 31-0 and grabbed the top spot in the national poll before falling to Michigan Tech in overtime in the quarterfinals of the national tournament.
- Washburn has outshot opponents in 10 of 12 games this season. The Lady Blues have held the opposition to under 50 percent from the field in every game.
- Washburn's starting frontcourt, Crystal Walker and Carissa Goeglein were both selected as preseason All-America players by the Women's Division II Bulletin, a publication focused solely on women's Division II basketball.
- The Lady Blues were picked 16th in the Women's Division II Bulletin Preseason Poll.

The Lady Blues were also picked second in the MIAA Preseason Coaches Poll. Defending conference champion Missouri Western was ranked No. 1 in the poll.
